The Alberta Human Rights Act protects you from discrimination and makes sure that you have an equal opportunity to find a place to live. When are you in a rental situation, there are other laws that apply, for example, the Residential Tenancies Act (RTA). In Alberta, the RTA outlines the rights and responsibilities of most landlords and tenants in Alberta. The RTA also includes rules about:

- How landlords and tenants can end the tenancy agreement.
- Security deposits.
- Inspection reports.
- Evictions.
- What landlords and tenants can do if things go wrong.

The RTA does not apply to shared accommodation situations where a tenant shares living space with a landlord. The lease between the landlord and tenant will contain the rules that both parties will have to follow.

What are my rights as a tenant?

Under the RTA, the landlord has a number of obligations that form part of your rights as a tenant. Some of the basics rights that tenants have under the RTA are:

- The property must be ready for you to move into on the move-in date.
- You must be given the landlord's contact information.
- You have the right to peaceful enjoyment of the premises.
- Inspection reports must be completed within one week of move-in and move-out.
- Your property must meet minimum housing and health standards. For example, the landlord must make sure that the structure of the building is safe and the property is pest-free.
- Your rent cannot be increased more than once every 365 days.
- If you have a periodic tenancy, you must be given 3 months' written notice of any rent increase.
- If your periodic lease ends, you must be given a valid reason under the RTA. For example, the landlord is moving in or the property is sold.



What are my responsibilities as a tenant?

Some of the basics responsibilities that tenants have under the RTA are:

- Pay the rent as required by the tenancy agreement.
- Look after the rental unit, keep it clean, and not damage it or the common areas of the property.
- Do not interfere with the rights of the landlord or tenants in other units.
- Do not do anything illegal in the rental unit or common areas of the property.
- Do not endanger or threaten other people or property in the rental unit or common greas.
- Move out of the rental unit at the end of a fixed term tenancy. For periodic tenancies, give the required notice to end the tenancy, in writing, and move out by the date given to the landlord.
- Do not change the locks without permission from the landlord.
