Make a Will

A Will is a legal document used after you pass away. In it, you name a **personal representative**, also known as an executor, to deal with your **estate** according to your written instructions.

Your Will should include several items. It's a good idea to review the questions below and then take some time to think and plan before you make your Will. Your **estate** is the property you own at the time of your death, including your home, money, pets, vehicles and other belongings. Your estate does **not** usually include property you co-own in joint tenancy and assets with designated beneficiaries.
