How Are You Protected?



The Alberta Human Rights Act is legislation that protects Albertans from discrimination at work. Discrimination can be intentional or unintentional, but it is always wrong under the Act.

Protected Grounds



Filing a Complaint



If you feel that you have been discriminated against you can make a complaint to the Alberta Human Rights Commission (AHRC).

There is no cost for filing a complaint

The Commission will accept your complaint if:



The incident happened in Alberta.



You have reasonable (bona fide) grounds for believing that you have been discriminated against.



The alleged discrimination is within the grounds and areas protected by the Act.



The complaint is outside of the juristiction of the Canadian Human Rights Commission*.



The complaint was made within one year after the alleged discrimination occured.

* If a complaint can be made under the Canadian Human Rights Act, it should be made with the Canadian Human Rights Commission
